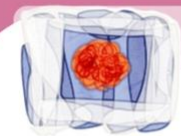

And from these weatherworlds they will infer the needs for climate services – current and future. This is what CoCliServ is about.

The Kerourien site -St. Pierre quarter in Brest, France- is mostly structured around post-war housing projects. During World War II, the city of Brest was one of the worst damaged areas on France's west coast. Brest's reconstruction came on October 3rd, 1944. The Kerourien urbanization initiated on January 8th, 1964 which marked a clear turning point in the progressive transformation of Kerourien from a rural to a periurban area.

According to the 2013 census, Kerourien has 1200 residents. It is a priority area, mostly structured around post-war housing projects, with a strong "social inclusion" focus. Kerourien is one of the most diverse areas in the city and the most challenged in terms of urbanization, migration, and empowerment.
